Lesson 1: Past

Scottish locally extinct species. Linking this to the core concepts: habitat destruction and biodiversity. Thought experiment on tree cover change.

Lesson 2: Present

Making decisions on species survival to highlight species interdependence and complex food webs.

Lesson 3: Future

Emphasise how the decision making process is carried out in conservation and to introduce the concept of rewilding in the form of a debate.
